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## What Comes Next? Bingo

#### Purpose:

The purpose of this bingo game is to provide a fun way to drill the children on counting skills, especially from progessing from one set of tens to another. (Ie., 29, 30, and 49, 50, etc.).

#### Preparation:

- 1. Print out all of the bingo cards and the calling cards on card stock. Either laminate the bingo cards or place them in page protectors. Cut apart the calling cards and mix them up.
- 2. Each child will need six markers each. We enjoy using magnetic chips for this purpose, but any type of marker or manipulative will do, including unifix cubes, pennies, etc. If magnetic chips are used, then wands that attract magnets can be given to the children when they get a bingo to help them collect up their chips and play again. We never pass out the wands until the children get a bingo.


#### To play:

- 1. Pass out the bingo cards. Give each child six markers or chips.
- 2. Have the bingo caller read the numbers on each calling card. The children must listen to it and try to tell the number that comes next. Then they should look for that letter on their card. If they find it, then they can cover it up with a chip or marker. If they are having trouble figuring out the next number, get out a hundreds chart and look for the pattern.
- 3. The first child to cover all six of the squares on his or her card has a bingo, and can call out, "Bingo!" We usually give that child some cereal as a treat. The rest of the children in the group continue playing until they all get a bingo and a treat as well. Then we play again!
